COST OF POSTSECONDARY EDUCATION (AVERAGES)

- AVERAGE TUITION PER YEAR:
 - (Ontario) College 2021/2022: \$2,400-\$6,1000 (certificate, diploma, degree)
 - o (Canadian) University 2021/2022: \$6,693 (undergraduate degree)
- FEES, BOOKS, SUPPLIES: \$2,000
- PERSONAL EXPENSES: vary by student's choices and needs
- ATTENDING SCHOOL WHILE LIVING AWAY FROM HOME: \$10,000+
- OVERALL COST: UNIVERSITY + LIVING AWAY FROM HOME: \$20,000+

APPLICATION FEES

UNIVERSITY

- Apply through <u>Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC)</u>. You will need a PIN from Guidance. Apply by JAN 13.
- Base Application Fee: \$150 for your initial 3 program choices + \$50 for every extra choice.
- Maximum 3 choices at any one university.

COLLEGE

- Apply through ontariocolleges.ca by FEB 1.
- Fee: \$95 for 5 program choices. No extra choices.
- Maximum 3 programs at any one college.

- Savings; part-time & summer jobs
- Parents/guardians/family
- Banks, credit unions: loan/student line of credit
- Government: Ontario Student Assistance Program (OSAP)
- Scholarships and bursaries
- Co-op programs, e.g., University Of Waterloo Co-Op

OSAP

- LOANS & GRANTS
- OPTION: DECLINE THE LOAN AND ACCEPT THE GRANT
- ADDITIONAL GRANTS: STUDENTS IN SPECIAL CIRCUMSTANCES
- ASSISTANCE DEPENDS ON:
 - education costs/living expenses
 - o financial resources: student/family

NOTES ON OSAP

- Expected contribution from student (\$3,600). Parent contribution depends on income.
- OSAP Aid Estimator
- Apply online after you accept an offer by June 30
- Review/appeal process: Extenuating circumstances considered
- Important: Notify the financial aid office at your school of any financial changes in your situation.

SCHOLARSHIPS, BURSARIES & AWARDS

- Scholarships -- merit.
- Bursaries -- financial need.
- Awards -- outstanding achievement. May not be monetary, e.g., plaque.

DEBUNKING THE MYTHS

- Scholarships are offered throughout the year.
- Students going to university, college, and those pursuing trade & technical programs are eligible to apply for many scholarships.
- You do not need to be a 90%+ student for many scholarships.
- Most scholarships are in the \$1000-\$2500 range.

WHY SHOULD YOU APPLY FOR SCHOLARSHIPS?

- Balance work and school
- Win other scholarships
- Great entry on a resumé or job application
- Potential for networking/mentoring

UNIVERSITY & COLLEGE ENTRANCE AWARDS

Two types of entrance/admission scholarships:

1. AUTOMATIC

- Based on grades usually starting at 80% (but may be lower in some instances)
- No application needed at most schools. (some colleges may require an application.).
- May be renewable

2. MAJOR ADMISSION AWARDS ("Full Ride")

- Based on high achievement
- Application required; nomination from high school sometimes required
- Be aware of deadlines, e.g., University of Toronto: The National Scholarship;
 Queen's University Major Admission Awards

OTHER AWARDS

- Entrance bursaries: based on financial need. If you miss the Entrance Bursary deadline, apply for the General Bursary in the fall or winter.
- Other awards: faculty/dept./program; private donors; Athletic Financial Awards
- External awards

- · Have someone proofread application
- Bursaries: Be transparent

- Leadership/innovation

- Essay that gives a good impression of your character, values, and goals
- Excellent references

WINNING ESSAY

- Share one or two areas you are passionate about
- Use key words & concrete examples
- Describe any obstacles you have overcome (as well as failures)
- Expand on your long-term goals
- Share YOUR story

A STRONG REFERENCE LETTER

- Speaks to your character
- Provide details to referee
- · Tailor the letter to award specifications
- · Give two weeks minimum to write the letter

HOW TO PREPARE FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

- Create an activity list/build resume
- Identify strengths/uniqueness
- · Organize/build timeline
- Job/internship/new initiative
- Choose references
- Clean up social media
- Create a LinkedIn profile
- · Research scholarships: The Scholarship Report.
